DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Hume-Bischof House, also known as Happy Ridge Farm, is located at the eastern edge of Jefferson County on U.S. Highway 60. Though situated close to the road on a slight rise, the house is well-shielded by shrubbery and large trees.

The two-story white painted brick structure is a handsome example of the Federal style of this period in Kentucky. The main block, with Flemish bond brick work, is a single pile plan with central hallways. A two-story, frame ell at the rear now contains a kitchen, and a bedroom and bath on the second story. A small, one-room addition on the back of the ell, now a den, may have been an outdoor kitchen. Interior chimneys in the end walls of the main block are unusual in Jefferson County. They project from the wall plane about the width of a single brick. (Photo 1, 3)

The five-bay facade has a central entrance with a fine large arched fanlight and sidelights. Windows are nine-over-nine pane and many original glass panes are extant, (Photo 1, 2)

The stairway in the twelve foot wide hall rises gracefully to the second story with a balcony landing, slender, plain balusters and newel posts, and carved fretwork on the stringers. (Photo 5, 6)

The parlor, to the left of the hall, has its original chair rail and handsome woodwork with panels and rosette corner blocks. The large Federal-style mantel is embellished with a central medallion, and other details reminiscent of the work of Robert Adam. (Photo 7)

To the right of the hall is the dining room. The fireplace has been closed and the mantel removed, though it has been saved and is stored on the farm. Flanking the space where the fireplace was located are large, built-in presses with wood doors. Both dining room and hall retain the original chair rail. A doorway in the dining room which was once an outside entry, but now leads into the ell, still has its original large, stone slab sill, worn smooth over the years.

The two bedrooms on the second story have chair rails and simple mantels. One bedroom has built-in presses on either side of the fireplace. (Photo 8)

A small bath has been added at the top of the stairs in a space that was perhaps once used as a nursery. The two-story ell formerly had only one room on the second story--a "travelers room," reached only by a back stairway. That room has been altered to accommodate a smaller bedroom and a bath. The kitchen on the first floor of the ell has tongue-in-groove wood paneling on the lower part of the walls. Most of the woodwork in the ell is in the "eared," Greek Revival style, indicating a possible later construction date for that portion of the house.

Photographs of the house taken in 1922 showed an "Eastlake" style front porch and a second front door where one of the dining room windows is now located. (View 1)

The porch and door were later removed. The same photograph shows the house as situated on almost the same grade as the highway. The road-bed has been cut down over the years, leaving the house on a higher level above the road.

The site is in a completely rural setting, and with its fine interior woodwork and doorway, is one of the foremost examples of this early period in eastern Jefferson County. Only one outbuilding remains, which is found approximately 20 feet behind the main house. It is of 19th century construction, built possibly for servants quarters.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Hume-Bischof House located on the Jefferson County-Shelby County line, is a handsome example of a domestic architectural style found in Kentucky houses built from the late 1700's into the 1820's.

Research has proved inconclusive in determining a definite date of construction or the original builder/owner. Stylistically the house appears to be an early nineteenth century structure, perhaps built between 1810-1825. Details such as the large, widely spaced windows, the high ceilings and spacious rooms, and the wide, sidelighted entrance with a semi-circular fanlight are more typical of houses built in Kentucky in the first quarter of the nineteenth century. Interior features such as the very decorative parlor mantel and the fretwork on the stairway stringers would also place the construction date closer to the 1820's, although it is certainly possible that these details could have been later additions to an early house.

Original ownership of the house has been attributed to John Hume, who is said to have built the house around 1790 on or near the site of Hume Station. Hume is supposed to have come from Virginia about 1783 and settled near Long Run. Only two references to a Hume Station have been found. One appears in George L. Willis' History of Shelby County, Kentucky (1929), and the other is on photographs of the house and a small graveyard, taken in 1922 by R.C. Ballard Thruston. Hume Station does not appear in lists of early Kentucky forts and stations. Jillson's Kentucky Land Grants, lists a John Hume as having 1000 acres in Jefferson County on Floyd's Fork, surveyed in August 1784, which could possibly have encompassed the site where the house now stands. The graveyard, supposed to have contained the graves of John Hume and his wife, was on the south side of U.S. 60 across from the house and was destroyed in the 1940's when the now defunct Brentlawn Trotting Track was built. It could be assumed that the residence of John Hume would have been nearby the graveyard site, but no documentation has been found to indicate his residence was the present house.

Deed research has not been helpful in determining the first owner of the house or the date of construction, because the present tract of land was assembled from numerous smaller tracts which, in the nineteenth century, were part of much larger parcels of land. Complicating

the title search is the fact that many of the tracts lie in both Shelby and Jefferson Counties. In the absence of other corroborating material, it has been virtually impossible to place the house on a specific tract of land in the early nineteenth century. Some of the tracts can be traced to John Hume's 1000 acre pre-emption. Other tracts involved were traced to the Netherton family and then to Benjamin Hughes, who in the early 1800's acquired large tracts in this area which were originally part of James Kemp's grant.

A plot of the line between Jefferson and Shelby Counties, recorded in 1802, shows the road from Louisville to Shelbyville where it crosses the County line. No structure is shown on what would be the present site of the Hume-Bischof House. A structure does appear south of the road in Jefferson County with the name "Hughes" adjacent. (Map 1)

The 1858 Map of Jefferson County by G.T. Bergman, clearly shows a structure on the County line north of the road. The owner's name appears on the map as William Welch. At least one tract of the current site can be traced back to William Welch in the mid-nineteenth century and then further back to John Netherton and then to Benjamin Hughes. A family connection between the Netherton and Hume families can be found. John Hume's grandson, John H. Sturgeon, married Margaret Netherton, daughter of John Netherton in 1815. Although John Hume's will indicated that his grandsons, John H. and Hume Sturgeon, were to eventually inherit the 400 acre tract where John Hume lived, no conclusive evidence has been found to prove that this tract included the present site of the house. It may just as easily be assumed that the site of the house was part of the tract sold by John Netherton to William Welch, in 1831.

Tax records were of little help since land evaluation was not reported until 1814. The value of the various tracts fluctuated and the acreages changed so that no definite conclusions could be drawn as to a possible construction date.

After 1858 the history of the house is more easily followed. William Welch died in 1866 and in 1867 his executor sold 381 acres, probably including the house, to John L. Gregg of Shelby County. The 1879 Atlas of Jefferson County shows John L. Gregg at this site and the 1882 Shelby County Atlas indicated a structure on the County line with the name J.L. Gregg. The various tracts of land passed through several owners in the late 1800's and early 1900's. In 1918 Daniel C. Clarke acquired several tracts totalling 356 acres

including the house. Clarke was a real estate developer and builder who lived in Louisville. It was probably Clarke who removed the "Eastlake" style porch and the second front door shown in Thruston's 1922 photograph. He may have made other alternations as well. According to a 1928 biography, Clarke owned a farm where he bred Holstein cattle. It was called Echo Farms, located on the Shelbyville Road, and probably included the land now known as Happy Ridge Farm. In 1934 a 205 acre portion of Clarke's land was bought by Lawrence F. Bischof, the present owner.

Although the original owner and date of construction of the Hume-Bischof House cannot be definitely determined, the structure is a significant and important example of early nineteenth century architecture. An unusual element is the slight protrusion of the interior chimneys. This detail is not typical in Jefferson County, but appears on Shelby County houses as well as residences in the Bluegrass region of Kentucky.

The house is typical of many Federal-type houses built in Kentucky in the early 1800's, but its fine details such as chair rails, pegged doors, handsome mantels and stairway, and large fanlight give it an extra measure of elegance and significance.

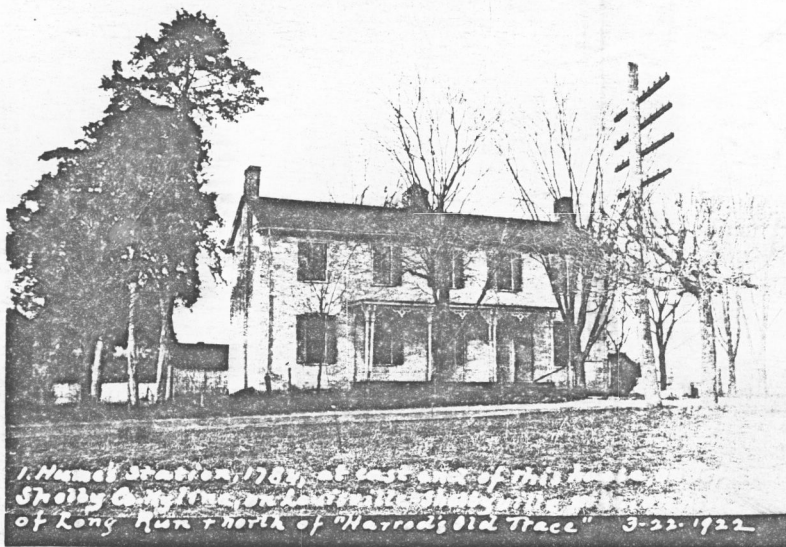

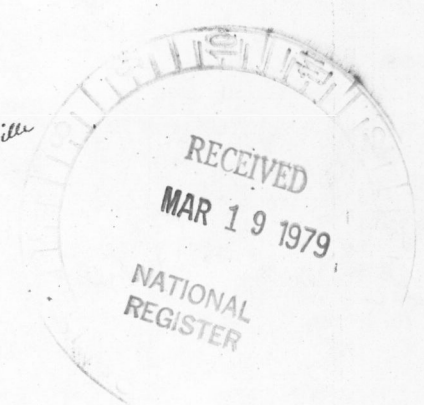

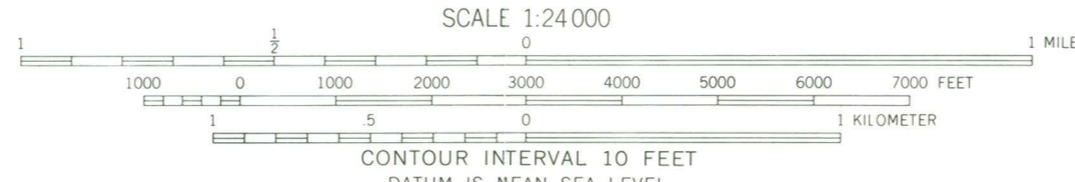
